Course Description:

It is recommended that you have taken ESL 331, Intermediate Multiskills II before this class. ESL 340 is an advanced English course for non-native speakers, incorporating academic skills. Emphasis is on further development in listening, speaking, reading, writing, grammar, and vocabulary in general and academic contexts.

Grammar Topics Covered:

- 1. Review of grammar structures taught in previous levels as needed
- 2. Verb tense review & expansion (perfect tenses)
- 3. Adjective clauses (restrictive/nonrestrictive, reductions, etc.)
- 4. Sentence connectors with correct punctuation
 - Adverb clauses and phrases (time, cause and effect, opposition, condition) (e.g. Before he went to bed ... Before going to bed...)
 - Transitions (although, however, nevertheless, consequently, therefore, despite)
 - Paired conjunctions (both, either, neither...nor)
- 5. Noun clauses & reported Speech
- 6. Gerunds and infinitives
- 7. Expansion of phrasal verbs
- 8. Real/Unreal conditionals in past/present/future
- 9. Passive voice





Evaluation:

- * Homework: Homework is to be completed at home, and I will give you the answers to check yourself. It is important to correct your own work at home, so we do not spend unnecessary time in class going over the answers. It is important to understand WHY you got a question wrong. I will reserve some class time for questions every day to help you with wrong answers on your homework. For each hour in class per week, it is expected that you will study 2 hours outside of class with homework or independent study.
- **Essay:** We will learn about how to write an academic-style essay in class and complete one 4-5 paragraph essay. This writing will use a process method that requires several steps of drafting and editing/reviewing. It is important to complete all steps in order to receive full credit.
- * Tests/Quizzes: There will be approximately 7 grammar/reading/vocabulary and 3 phrasal verb quizzes during the semester. This number is subject to change depending on how long we take to finish units. No make-up quizzes will be given unless arranged in advance.
- * Final Exam & Midterm: The midterm will be given around week 8 or 9 depending on the pace of the class. The final exam will be given during the final week of classes. The date is yet to be determined. There will be no make-ups.
